

Is it possible to be a Christian if you struggle to believe that Jesus was born a virgin?

If one denies essential Christian doctrine, then he is outside the kingdom of God. The bible is able to make one "adequate, equipped for every good work" (2 Ti 3:17). The psalmist wrote, "The law of the Lord is perfect, restoring the soul" (Ps 19:7). Apart from scripture, no spiritual truth can be known. The gospel is simple enough for a child to understand (Matthew 11:25, KJV). God's word is able to make wise the simple (Ps 19:7).

Belief in: the trinity (Is 6:3), incarnation (1 Jn 4:2-3)¹, virgin birth (Is 7:14)² and bodily resurrection (1 Co 15:14) is essential Christian doctrine.

Certain teachings of scripture carry threats of damnation to those who deny them: acknowledgment of sin (1 Jn 1:6-10), justification by faith (Ro 4:4-5)³, Lordship (Ro 10:9) and love for God (1 Co 12:3, 16:22).

Faith is essential to have a right relationship with the Lord (Heb 11:6). Belief in the fundamentals of Christianity is a matter of eternal life and death. "Without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him" (Hebrews 11:6).

One must believe (1 Jn 2:23) in the Jesus of scripture (Jn 17:3; 14:6; Ac 4:12). He is God incarnate (1 Jn 5:20; Jn 8:58; 10:30). Jesus is worthy to receive all honor like the Father and the Sprit (Jn 5:23). The truth of his divine Sonship and Messiahship is essential (Jn 20:31).

Those who misrepresent scripture will be destroyed (2 Pe 3:16). A high, lofty view of scripture⁴ is the mark of a true Christ-follower.

The person and the work of Jesus⁵ is all-important (1 Co 3:11). God's word can be trusted (Mt 5:18, Jn 1:1, 14). Those who set it aside for their own traditions (Mark 7:6-9) and do not abide in his teachings (2 Jn 9-11) will be damned.⁶

Individuals who have difficulty believing are encouraged to come and reason with the Lord (Is 1:18); so that they do not condemn themselves (John 3:18). The Lord is able to open blind eyes and change unbelieving hearts (Mk 9:24, Ac 9:8-9).

Those who deny essential teachings or aid and abet the enemy heap judgment upon themselves (Mt 12:30, 2 Jn 11, 1 Co 5:1-3). Satan uses them for his own purposes and then flips them like a cigarette butt (Pr 21:28, Mk 4:15).⁷
