Do women who are pastoring a church have the Holy Spirit? If they do, why doesn't the Holy Spirit tell them that what they are doing having authority over men in the church is wrong?

The apostle Paul said, "I suffer not that woman to teach [trying to bring in the doctrine of Diana] (1 Ti 2:12)." Diana (also known as Artemis) was a pagan fertility goddess worshiped in ancient Ephesus. Diana's worship was widespread at the time.

Women have taught and interpreted scripture. In the early church, Paula, a wealthy convert, worked alongside Jerome in translating the Latin Vulgate Bible [1][2]. In fourth-century Rome, Marcella was known for her scriptural interpretation, with Jerome referring people to her for correct understanding of biblical texts[1]. During the 18th century, Susanna Wesley, mother of John and Charles Wesley, delivered sermons to parishioners [1]. In the 19th and early 20th centuries, Bible institutes promoted women in the ministry [1]. The New Testament itself provides examples of women teaching scripture, such as Mary's hymn (the Magnificat) in Luke 1:46-55 [3]. Timothy's mother Eunice and grandmother Lois taught him the scriptures [3].

Some debate women's roles in teaching men; but, there are efforts to train women to teach effectively in scriptural matters[4].
