

*Are all the gods from ancient mythology really just fallen angels?*

The historian Josephus, interpreted the "sons of God" mentioned in Genesis 6:2 as angels[1]. This interpretation is supported by some translations of the Old Testament[1]. Ancient pagan legends, such as those of Hercules and Gilgamesh, might have their basis in the "men of renown" described in Genesis 6:4[1]. Some biblical passages, such as Jude 6-7, are interpreted by some as referring to angels who abandoned their proper domain and engaged in inappropriate behavior[2]. Scholars however are not agreed upon facts. There is no definitive evidence that gods from ancient mythology were actually fallen angels[3][4][5].
